#### Reflection

Faith, in its purest expression, begins not in certainty but in movement. In the Gospel, those who sought mercy were asked to go before they had yet seen any sign of change. Their healing was not given as proof to convince them to believe; it occurred as they journeyed. That subtle yet profound sequence reveals something essential about the nature of faith. God's grace is not always granted as a condition for movement, but often as its consequence. The divine response meets those who are already on the way.

This is a faith that does not bargain with God for assurance before obedience. It acts, it moves, it walks - trusting that something holy will happen within the journey itself. The command to go was an invitation to begin, and in beginning, they discovered that God's word was already at work. Faith is never static; it is a living, breathing motion towards the One who calls. In this light, faith is

less about possession and more about pilgrimage. It unfolds not in grand gestures but in small, obedient steps that lead us gradually from fear into trust.

challenge for modern disciples lies precisely here. We often long for the clarity of visible results before committing our hearts to God's word. We prefer the security of confirmation before the risk of movement. Yet divine grace rarely works according to our calculations. It begins where we take the first uncertain step, where we decide to live as though God's promise were already fulfilled. Faith matures not in moments of triumph but in the quiet endurance of those who continue walking through uncertainty. It is there, on that interior road, that transformation occurs - silently, sometimes unnoticed, but unmistakably real.

This Gospel moment speaks powerfully to the life of every believer. There are prayers that have lingered unanswered, relationships that remain unreconciled, burdens that seem unmoved. And yet, the call persists: Go forward. Not because the way is clear, but because the Word is trustworthy. In taking that step, even when vision is dim, we enter the sacred rhythm of grace. God's power does not only meet us at the end of our journey; it accompanies every step we dare to take in trust.

To live such faith is to understand that the miracle of discipleship is rarely sudden. It happens along the road, hidden within obedience, unfolding in those who keep walking even when they have not yet seen. For those who continue to move in faith, even the most desolate path becomes the meeting ground of heaven and earth the very place where God's promise quietly takes flesh in the perseverance of His people.

# Pope Leo XIV Apostolic Exhortation "Dilexit Te"

On Thursday, the Holy Father Pope Leo XIV released his first Apostolic Exhortation of the pontificate, Dilexit Te, a profound reflection on the Christian vocation to love and serve the poor. In this document, the Pope calls the faithful to rediscover compassion not as sentiment but as a concrete expression of discipleship, urging parishes and individuals alike to make generosity a visible mark of faith in a divided world.
