### *Extraordinary Grace in "Ordinary" Time*

As the festive lights of Christmas are packed away and the "January blues" settle in, the Church enters a season we call **Ordinary Time**. To the casual observer, the name suggests something plain or unexciting—a mundane stretch of the calendar. However, the term actually derives from the word **ordinal**, meaning "numbered." It is a rhythmic counting of the weeks that lead us through the life and ministry of Jesus. Far from being "simple," this season is an invitation to find the extraordinary presence of God within the regular patterns of our lives.

This Sunday, the liturgy bridges the gap between the wonder of Christ's birth and the beginning of his public mission. In the Gospel of John (1:29-34), we encounter John the Baptist at a pivotal moment. He sees Jesus approaching and cries

out: "*Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world.*"

What follows is a masterclass in Christian discipleship. John the Baptist was a man of immense influence, with his own followers and a reputation that shook Jerusalem. Yet, when the Messiah appears, John does not seek to share the spotlight. Instead, he engages in a profound act of **self-diminution**. He admits, "*I did not know him,*" and insists that his own role was merely to prepare the way through water, so that the One who baptizes with the Holy Spirit might be revealed.

John's humility is the blueprint for our own journey through these numbered weeks. In a culture that demands we "brand" ourselves and seek constant recognition, the Baptist whispers a different truth: we are at our most effective when we point away from ourselves and toward Christ. This is the essence of the "ordinary" disciple—to be a conduit

rather than a destination. St. Augustine famously noted that John is merely the "voice," while the Lord is the "Word." A voice exists only to carry the message; once the Word is heard, the voice naturally fades so the truth may resonate.

This discipline of stepping back allows the glory of God to become visible in our daily actions. **St. Bernard of Clairvaux** captured this spirit of holy redirection when he wrote, "*The man who is wise will see his life as more like a reservoir than a canal. The canal filters out as much as it takes in, but the reservoir waits to be filled before it overflows.*" By emptying ourselves of the need for prominence, we become reservoirs of his grace. As we move into this season, our task is to embrace this "ordinary" path of John—to decrease so that Christ may increase, and to find our purpose in simply saying to the world, "Behold the Lamb."

There will be no Adoration and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament on Friday 23 January. However, there will be Mass at 10 am.
