Call to conversion...

The liturgy of the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time offers an opportunity for all of us to attend with renewed seriousness to the pattern of divine calling that emerges within Scripture. Although the Feast of the Conversion of Saint Paul yields to the Sunday observance, its spiritual depth remains a valuable lens through which we may approach the Gospel of Matthew 4:12–23. When these two moments of revelation are held together, a single unifying theme becomes evident: the grace of hearing the call of God and the responsive movement of the human heart that follows such hearing.

The transformation of Paul on the road to Damascus stands as a vivid expression of the primacy of grace. Paul does not begin by seeking a new direction. The divine Word addresses him, interrupts his certainties, and invites him into an unforeseen horizon. Hans Urs von Balthasar notes that Paul's vocation reveals how authentic mission arises only when a person allows divine

initiative to redefine the foundations of life. Paul hears a voice that reshapes both his understanding of God and his understanding of himself. His response is not a mere adjustment of behaviour but a surrender to a radically new identity given in Christ.

The Gospel passage for this Sunday presents a parallel dynamic within the first steps of the public ministry of Our Lord. Christ speaks, and those who hear are invited into a new way of living. The scene does not present a dramatic rupture like Paul's, yet it reveals a similar pattern: the divine voice enters ordinary circumstances and invites a willingness to relinquish familiar securities. The response of those who follow Christ expresses a readiness to listen with the whole heart. It also demonstrates that discipleship begins not with self-directed initiative but with attentive receptivity.

Pope Benedict XVI writes that the heart of Christian hearing is "*an obedience that listens, and a listening that obeys*". This insight illuminates

both Paul's conversion and the calling of the first disciples. In each case, divine summons and human response form a single movement of grace. This Sunday therefore encourages us to consider our own disposition to such listening. The call of Christ is not confined to extraordinary moments. It reaches us in prayer, in Scripture, in the quiet movements of conscience, and in the needs of those around us. The question is whether we cultivate the interior readiness that allows God to reorient our path.

By contemplating the beginnings of Christ's ministry alongside the mystery of Paul's conversion, we are invited to rediscover that Christian life is always founded upon this dynamic encounter between the divine call and the human response. To hear with faith and to follow with trust remains the essential shape of every authentic vocation.
